# Regulations concerning Registration Procedures, the Number of Credits Required for Graduation, and Other Matters for Courses Offered by the School of Language and Culture Studies of the Tokyo University of Foreign Studies

March 19, 2019
Rule No. 50

Amended on January 13, 2021: Rule No. 2 of the School of Language and Culture Studies

Regulations Concerning Registration Procedures, the Number of Credits Required for Graduation, and Other Matters for Courses Offered by the School of Language and Culture Studies of the Tokyo University of Foreign Studies (established on March 27, 2012) shall be amended in its entirety as follows.

#### Article 1 Purpose

The purpose of these Regulations is to specify necessary details concerning registration procedures, the number of credits required for graduation, and other matters for courses prescribed in the Regulations concerning Courses Offered and the Number of Credits Assigned to Each Course at the School of Language and Culture Studies of the Tokyo University of Foreign Studies (Rule No. 12 of 2012), in accordance with the provisions of Article 29 and Article 44, paragraph 2 of the University Regulations of National University Corporation Tokyo University of Foreign Studies (established on April 1, 1977; hereinafter referred to as the "University Regulations").

### Article 2 Definition, etc.

- 1 In these Regulations, the following terms shall be defined as follows.
  - (1) "Major Language" means the language decided at the time of admission to the University.
  - (2) "Region" means the region decided at the time of admission to the University.
  - (3) "Non-module" means the method of taking the Major Language Courses in which students are required to earn ten (10) credits collectively through the courses of grammar, conversation, composition, reading, etc. offered throughout the first year.
  - (4) "Module" means the method of taking the Major Language Courses in which classes are organized according to the genre and difficulty level of grammar, conversation, composition, reading, etc. per semester and students earn one (1) credit each for each of them.
- 2 The registration procedures for Major Language Courses shall be as shown in the following table.

# Article 3 Number of Credits Required for Graduation

- Students shall earn one hundred and twenty-five (125) credits required for graduation as prescribed in Article 44, paragraph 1 of the University Regulations, according to the following course categories:
  - (1) Foundation Courses 3 credits
  - (2) Liberal Arts Courses 12 credits or more
  - (3) Language Courses 38 credits or more
  - (4) Region Related Courses 6 credits or more
  - (5) Introductory Courses 6 credits or more
  - (6) Survey Courses 14 credits or more
  - (7) Major Courses 24 credits or more
  - (8) Graduation Project 8 credits
  - (9) Related Courses 0 credits or more

2 Credits shall be counted in accordance with the provisions of Article 30 of the University Regulations.

Article 4 Course Registration Procedures, etc.

The year in which each course should be taken and the minimum number of credits required therefor shall be as per the relevant Appendix shown below:

- (1) Appendix 1 Major language: English
- (2) Appendix 2 Major Language: German, French, Italian, Spanish, Portuguese, Russian (Russian Area), Chinese, Korean, Arabic
- (3) Appendix 3 Major Language: Polish, Czech, Mongolian, Indonesian, Malaysian, Filipino, Thai, Lao, Vietnamese, Cambodian, Burmese, Urdu, Hindi, Bengali, Persian, Turkish
- (4) Appendix 4 Major Language: Russian (Central Asia area)
- Article 5 Replacement of Major Language Courses under Language Courses, etc.

Students who have already earned the major language (excluding English) may take a part or all of the Major Language Courses for the first or second year as designated courses specified separately.

#### Article 6 Restriction on Registration for Language Courses

- 1 Students shall not take any Major Language Courses under the category of the Language Courses for any major language other than that decided at the time of admission.
- 2 Students shall not, in principle, take the GLIP English Courses, Foreign Languages Courses, or Regional Languages Courses under the category of Language Courses in any of the following cases:
  - (1) Enrollment in the GLIP English Courses, Foreign Languages Courses, and Regional Languages Courses by a student whose native language is the relevant language; and
  - (2) Enrollment in the Foreign Languages Courses and Regional Language Courses by a student whose major language is the relevant language.
- Article 7 Enrollment in Seminar Courses under the Category of Major Courses

Students shall be required to earn four (4) credits for Seminar Courses under the category of Major Courses in their third and fourth years.

Article 8 (Enrollment in Graduation Research Seminar Courses under the Category of Major Courses)

Students shall be required to earn four (4) credits for Graduation Research Seminar Courses in their fourth year under the guidance of their supervising instructors.

# Article 9 Graduation Project

Students shall be required to earn eight (8) credits for the Graduation Project by writing a thesis, etc. in their fourth year.

### Article 10 Related Courses

Credits earned under the Core Seminar Program of the School of Language and Culture Studies or the School of International and Area Studies and credits earned at other universities may be treated as credits under Related Courses.

#### Article 11 Teaching Courses

Students who plan to satisfy requirements to obtain teacher certification shall earn all required credits from the courses listed in Appendices 5 to 8, including the courses stipulated in Article 66-6 of the Ordinance for Enforcement of the Education Personnel Certification Act (Ordinance of the Ministry of Education No. 26 of

1954).

# Article 12 Course Registration Requirements

Students who take Non-module language for the Major Language Courses I under the category of Language Courses shall not take the Major Language Courses II under the category of the Language Courses in the second year if they have not earned ten (10) credits in the first year.

#### Article 13 Advancement Requirements

A student who has completed the courses as shown in the table below by the end of the second year shall be determined to advance to the third year through deliberation by the Faculty Council of the School of Language and Culture Studies.

#### Article 14 Selection and Determination of Course of Study

- 1 Students shall select one (1) course of study from two (2) courses (Regional Studies and Trans-regional Studies) in the second year.
- 2 If the Dean of the School of Language and Culture Studies deems to be useful for education, students may change the course of study already determined.

#### Article 15 Restriction on Course Registration

- 1 Students shall register for up to fifty (50) credits per year. However, this shall not apply to third-year transfer students and students under the teacher-training curriculum.
- Irrespective of the provisions of the preceding paragraph, if students earned at least thirty (30) credits in the previous year, and the GPA for those credits is 3.0 or higher, they may register for up to 54 credits per year.

# Article 16 Miscellaneous Provisions

Any matters not set forth in these Regulations concerning course registration procedures, etc. shall be prescribed separately.

Supplementary provisions

- 1 These Regulations shall be effective as of April 1, 2019.
- Notwithstanding the provisions of the Regulations as amended, the course registration procedures for the courses offered and the number of credits required for graduation, etc. for the students who are already enrolled as of March 31, 2019 shall continue to be governed by the provisions of these Regulations then in force.

Supplementary provisions

These Regulations shall be effective as of April 1, 2021.
