# Fundamental Japanese Course (Japanese Language Program of TUFS)

# - Japanese Course Registration Outline -

Fundamental Japanese Course at TUFS (Japanese Language Program of TUFS (JLPTUFS)) is designed to teach Japanese to international students studying at TUFS. The program's curriculum is geared toward students who would like to learn Japanese for academic purposes.

At TUFS, the Spring Quarter begins in April and the Fall Quarter begins in October. JLPTUFS lasts for the 13 weeks of each quarter. However, please be aware that if a class has an insufficient number of students, that class may be cancelled.

### **Program Outline**

The Japanese Language Program has seven levels of class to accommodate the varying language proficiencies of students: Elementary 1, Elementary 2, Intermediate 1, Intermediate 2, Pre-Advanced, Advanced 1, and Advanced 2.

The following table shows which course(s) students in different categories will be allowed to enroll in. Where "②" is written, priority will be given to those students officially enrolled in the specified course. Where "○" is written, students may enroll in the specified courses only if there are enough places available.

### <Schedule from student's arrival in Japan to the start of Japanese language classes>

- Those students who have not yet taken the online placement test will be required to take the placement test ONLINE.
- Those who have not yet learned to read and write Hiragana (one of Japanese characters) will be required to take the Hiragana class ONLINE.

### **Hiragana Class:**

You must learn the basics of the Japanese writing system (Hiragana) ONLINE.

### **Placement Test:**

You must take the placement test ONLINE to determine your Japanese proficiency level.

### **Placement Test Level Announcement:**

Your level will be informed to you via E-mail at around April 15 (Wed.).

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Start of formal classes: April 20 (Mon.)

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You should purchase required textbooks at the university bookstore or ONLINE when you have decided to register particular classes. Photocopying a textbook is prohibited.

Deadline for Course Registration: April 24 (Fri.)

**NOTE:** 1) <u>Undergraduate Students</u>, <u>ISEPTUFS Students</u>, <u>Japanese Studies Students</u>, <u>Research Students and Preparatory Research Students</u> need to register classes <u>ONLINE</u> (13th through 17th, 20th through 24th, April). You can change your registration during the course registration amendment period (27th, April through 8th, May).

**NOTE:** 2) <u>Visiting Students</u> need to fill out and turn in the class registration form to Administrative Office by April 24th.

### **Hiragana Class**

International students who are learning Japanese for the first time must participate in the Hiragana Class. This class will teach students Hiragana, basic orthography. Textbooks used in all Japanese language classes are written entirely in Japanese, so students are expected to be able to read and write using Hiragana by the start of classes. Students who have learned Hiragana in the Hiragana class will be able to study Japanese effectively.

#### **Types of Classes Offered**

The chart on the next page lists the Japanese language classes offered each quarter, along with their codes. The "Integrated Classes" 101, 201, 301, 401 and 501 each has 5 periods, 601 has 3 periods, and 701 has 2 periods per week. "Focused/Topic Classes" at all levels have 1 period per week. One period is 90 minutes long.

When choosing the "Integrated" class, students need to participate in all the classes. The case when you choose to register the "Integrated Classes" where two sets of classes are offered, you must select and attend either A set classes or B set classes and cannot mix the two sets.

"Intensive Japanese 100" which offers 10 periods per week is only available for Undergraduate Students and Preparatory Research Students. ISEPTUFS Students and Research Students should register "Intensive 101."

NOTICE: Students of 700 level can take either "Reading 712" or "Reading Japanese Modern Literature," NOT both of them.

### Registration of Kanji Classes

Kanji classes (Kanji 901, 902, 903, 904; each class opens once a week) are offered for the students of 200 level or above. Kanji classes which these students can take are limited according to the levels of students, as seen in the chart below. For example, students of 200 level are allowed to take only Kanji 901, but students of level 300 can take either kanji 901 or Kanji 902, whichever they want to take.

# Please choose the class which suits your ability of reading and writing Kanji.

Students who passed the Kanji class in the fall quarter of 2019 can take the class of the next level.

\*Students of 100 level will study Kanji in the Intensive or Integrated class.

### **Class Registration**

In order to improve the communicative and academic skills in Japanese, <u>students of 100 to 600 levels are</u> <u>strongly recommended to take 3 credits or more in each semester</u>.

Once the classes the student wants to register for have been decided, you should make sure that the number of the classes to register is appropriate, that the Japanese language classes do not conflict with other classes to take and that the level of the classes are appropriate to their competence. Once checked, <u>Undergraduate Students</u>, <u>ISEPTUFS Students</u>, <u>Japanese Studies Students</u>, <u>Research Students and Preparatory Research Students need to register classes **ONLINE**. Visiting Students need to submit the Class Registration Form to their academic advisor.</u>

If you have any questions regarding class registration, you should consult with academic advisor. For inquiries for Japanese classes, Integrated/ Intensive Class Chief will answer them.

NOTICE: Students who are judged as "Upper-Advanced Level" (above level 700) in the result of the placement test and students who passed the subjects of 700 level in the fall quarter of 2019 are not allowed to take any class of Fundamental Japanese Course. These students are recommended to take specialized subjects offered in the Undergraduate program to advance proficiency in Japanese.

# **Upper Limit for registration for JLP classes**

<u>ISEPTUFS Students and Research Students</u> have upper limit for registration for JLP classes. <u>100-600 level students can register up to 6 credits</u>, <u>700 level students can register up to 3 credits</u>. There are two types of Japanese class registration: integrated-class type or focused-class type. Students with other categories do not have upper limit for registration.

# **Purchasing Textbooks**

Textbooks may be purchased at the COOP bookstore in University Hall. If you do not purchase textbooks after class registration, you will not be able to attend classes.

### **Class Enrollment and Credits**

ISEPTUFS Students, Japanese Studies Students and Undergraduate Students can receive credits for "Global Liberal Arts Subjects".

International students who are taking Japanese language classes as preparation for further education, research students enrolled in the TUFS undergraduate program or graduate program will not receive credit. However, a certificate of enrollment will be issued if necessary.

#### **Grades for Enrolled Classes**

Grades for classes in the Japanese Language Program of TUFS will be based upon the instructors' evaluations of the following areas:

1) Quizzes; 2) Mid-term and final examinations; 3) Course assignments and homework; 4) Active Learning assignments; 5) Class participation; 6) Achievement in other coursework given by instructors.

Final grades will be given on the following scale: S=90-100, A<sup>+</sup>=87-89, A=83-86, A<sup>-</sup>=80-82, B<sup>+</sup>=77-79, B=73-76, B<sup>-</sup>=70-72, C<sup>+</sup>=67-69, C=63-66, C<sup>-</sup>=60-62, F=0-59 (fail).

The grades (including F) of Japanese classes are also converted into GPA for Undergraduate Students, ISEPTUFS Students and Japanese Studies Students.

### **Class Attendance**

The Fundamental Japanese Course (JLPTUFS) provides students with opportunities to acquire communication skills and academic abilities and skills in Japanese effectively. Active participation in classes is a very important key to that goal and students are required to attend more than 80% of all classes. Students with poor attendance (i.e. below 80%), will not be able to take the mid-term and/or final exam(s) and will not be able to receive grades. Also, the Attendance of classes in the course is recorded by the Student Exchange Division. The Ministry of Justice's Immigration Bureau requires TUFS to record the students' class attendance in case an international student's attendance record is needed. Please note that a low attendance rate may result in losing your

international student status.

### **Rules Pertaining to Exams and Tests**

If you cheat during quizzes or mid-term and final examinations, your entire class registrations will be invalidated. There is a severe punishment for fraud. Please do NOT commit a dishonest act, even the suspected one.

### Supplementary Exams and Make-up Exams for Mid-terms and Finals

Students must take mid-term and final examinations for Japanese classes on the dates set by their instructors. However, if you are unable to take them for a given reason, you must inform the instructor of the reason and ask for a supplementary or make-up examination. A detailed schedule for mid-term and final examinations will be posted on the bulletin board.

### **Bulletin Board**

The <u>Japanese Language Program Bulletin Board</u> is located on the first floor of the Japanese Language Center. This is different from the bulletin board in front of the TUFS main administration building. Notices about tests and classroom changes, as well as important notices for students will be posted here. Check this bulletin board every day. Also, please check TUFS e-mail account everyday so that you can access class information.

### **Report Submission Box**

In the student mail room on the first floor of the Japanese Language Center, there is a report box. This box is used for submitting homework. Your teacher will instruct you when to use it.
