JLPTUFS : Japanese Language Program of TUFS

Course Guide of Fundamental Japanese Courses (JLPTUFS) Fall 2023

1. What is "Fundamental Japanese Courses (JLPTUFS)"?

- "Fundamental Japanese Courses (Japanese Language Program of TUFS)" is a Japanese program for international students studying at TUFS to acquire a high enough level of Japanese language proficiency for studying and researching at university.
- This program covers 7 levels of Japanese language proficiency: Elementary 1, Elementary 2, Intermediate 1, Intermediate 2, Pre-Advanced, Advanced 1, and Advanced 2.
- Each level has "Integrated" classes and "Focused" classes. In the "Integrated" classes, students comprehensively learn all four skills (reading, listening, writing, and speaking). As for "Focused" classes, there are a variety of classes such as grammar and Kanji in addition to reading comprehension, listening comprehension, writing communication and oral communication.

- Japanese language classes are offered in the Spring Quarter (April to July) and in the Fall Quarter (October to January). Each quarter has 13 weeks.

★ Classes in the Fundamental Japanese Courses (JLPTUFS) for Fall 2023 will primarily be done in person.

2. Who Can Take This Program?

- The table below shows which classes can be taken in accordance with the student categories ①~⑦.
- The "[©]" and "^O" in the table indicate the classes that can be taken. If there are a large number of students who wish to take the course, the students with the "[©]" will be prioritized. As a general rule, students cannot take classes with "-". Also, auditing is not permitted in this program.

3. Types of Classes Offered

- The table below lists the Japanese language classes offered in Fall 2023.
- Integrated Japanese 101, 201, 301, 401 and 501" each have 5 periods (5 credits), "Integrated Japanese 601" has 3 periods (3 credits), and "Integrated Japanese 701" has 2 periods (2 credits) per week. "Focused" classes each have 1 period (1 credit) per week. One period is 90 minutes long.
- New students' levels will be determined by the placement test. Students that are continuing will have their levels based on their grades and the courses that they took in the previous quarter.
- Please read "6. Notes on Course Registration (pp.5-6)" carefully when deciding which classes to take.

Notes

- The JLPT (Japanese Language Proficiency Test) and CEFR (Common European Framework of Reference for Languages) levels are the goals to be reached at the end of the courses. They are not the actual levels of the students.
- The actual Japanese level of the students at each level varies widely.
- The JLPTUFS offers classes aimed at improving students' academic Japanese proficiency and does not offer classes aimed at passing the JLPT.

4. Course Registration Procedures for New Students

- Students planning to take the Fundamental Japanese Courses (JLPTUFS) for the first time need to register for the courses according to the procedures shown below.
- Course registration can be done online through the Gakumu Information System. Visiting Students, Preparatory Research Students and other students (e.g., PCS Students) will be notified individually.

- Online classes will be conducted on Zoom.
 - \star The details on the Placement Test will be informed individually by email.



Students placed at the "Upper-Advanced" Level by the Placement Test are NOT required to take any classes in the Fundamental Japanese Courses (JLPTUFS). These students are recommended to take subjects taught in Japanese in the Undergraduate Program to brush up on their Japanese. However, if necessary, they may take up to three classes in each quarter.

5. Course Registration Procedures for Continuing Students

- Students who have taken Fundamental Japanese Courses (JLPTUFS) in Spring 2023 or before can register for the courses according to the procedures shown below.
- Course registration can be done online through the Gakumu Information System. Visiting Students, Preparatory Research Students and other students (e.g., PCS Students) will be notified individually.

- Online classes will be conducted on Zoom.
- For continuing students, if their grades in the previous quarter were "C⁻ (60 points)" or above, they can take the classes from the next level in this quarter.
 - ☞ "12. Grades and Evaluation (p.9)"
 - Example 1: B (75 points) in "Integrated 301" in Spring 2023
 → "Integrated 401" can be registered in Fall 2023.
 - Example 2: A⁻ (80 points) in "Kanji 902" in Spring 2023
 → "Kanji 903" can be registered in Fall 2023.
 - Example 3: F (below 60 points) in "Listening Comprehension 613" in Spring 2023
 → "Listening Comprehension 713" CANNOT be registered in Fall 2023



Students who have passed the Level 700 subject(s) by Spring 2023 are NOT required to take any classes in the Fundamental Japanese Courses (JLPTUFS). These students are recommended to take subjects taught in Japanese in the Undergraduate Program to brush up on their Japanese. However, if necessary, they may take up to three classes in each quarter.

6. Notes on Course Registration

Recommended Number of Periods to Be Taken

- It is recommended that students of Level 100-600 take at least 3 periods per quarter in order to improve their Japanese proficiency.
- ISEPTUFS Students and Research Students have an upper limit on the number of periods they can register (p.7).

Registration for Integrated Class

When taking an "Integrated" class, students must attend all 5 periods per week (3 for "Integrated Japanese 601" and 2 for "Integrated Japanese 701"). If there are 2 classes (A and B), students are to register for either A class or B class and attend only the registered one.

Registration for Kanji Class

- When taking a Kanji class, students must register for the class corresponding to their level as shown in the table below.
- Example 1: Elementary 2 (200) Level students
 - \rightarrow Only "Kanji 901" can be registered.
- Example 2: Intermediate 2 (400) Level students
 - \rightarrow Either "Kanji 902" or "Kanji 903" can be registered.
- Students should choose a class that suits their reading and Kanji writing ability. Students who cannot decide which class to take should consult with a Kanji class instructor.

* Students of Level 100 will study Kanji in the Integrated class.

Changing the Class Level

- As a general rule, students should take classes at the level where they are placed. However, students are free to take integrated and focused classes one level above or below their assigned level.
 - Example 1: Taking "Integrated 301", "Writing 314" and "Reading 412"
 - Example 2: Taking "Integrated 701" and "Listening 613"
- In order to take a class more than two levels above or below the placed level, <u>students must</u> consult with the instructor of the class they wish to take and obtain permission.

Upper Limit for Registration for Japanese Language Classes *ISEPTUFS Students and Research Students Only

As shown in the table below, ISEPTUFS Students and Research Students have an upper limit on the amount of Japanese language classes that they can register for in each quarter.

(Upper Limit for Registration for Japanese Language Classes)

Upper-Advanced Level students are NOT required to take classes in JLPTUFS. However, if necessary, they can take up to three classes.

- There is no upper limit on the number of classes that can be taken for Undergraduate Students, Preparatory Research Students and Japanese Studies Students.
- As for Visiting Students and other students (PCS Students, etc.), the classes to take will be decided through consultation with their academic advisor (p.11).

7. Online Classes

- Japanese language classes in this program will be primarily offered in person. However, in FY2023, some classes will be offered online (synchronous) using Zoom. Students are to attend the class(es) at the scheduled time.
- If the internet connection is unstable, students should consult with the class instructor.
- Students are prohibited to share the Zoom URL, ID, and password with anyone else, even with their classmates or friends.
- Recording, taking pictures during online classes, and posting them on social media is prohibited.
- Redistributing resources provided via online classes without the permission of the class instructor is prohibited.

8. Purchasing Textbooks

Students are to purchase textbooks as soon as they have decided on their classes. Textbooks can be purchased at the University CO-OP bookstore. The details such as business hours can be found on the website of the University CO-OP.

9 . Class Attendance

- In order to acquire a high level of Japanese language proficiency, active participation in class is very important, including in online classes. Students are required to attend classes unless they have special reasons.
- As a general rule, in the Fundamental Japanese Courses (JLPTUFS), <u>students with poor</u> attendance (below 80%) will be graded as F (Fail), unless they have special reasons.
- Immigration Services Agency of Japan requires TUFS to report the students' class attendance as needed. If attendance is not sufficient, students may lose their status as an international student.

10. Examinations

Midterms, Finals and Make-up Exams

- Students must take exams such as midterm exams and final exams under given conditions, following the instructions of the class instructor.
- Students who cannot or could not take an exam due to unavoidable reasons such as illness, accidents, or family reasons should consult with the class instructor for a make-up exam.

11. Academic misconduct

- Students who are found to have cheated in exams will have all of their course registration for the guarter invalidated. There are severe punishments for cheating during exams as well as for other forms of academic misconduct such as plagiarism in assignments. Students MUST NOT commit dishonest acts or acts that can be suspected of being dishonest.

- In the Fundamental Japanese Courses (JLPTUFS), grades will be given according to the 11scaled grading system from S to F as shown in the table below.
- The details on evaluation of each class can be found in the "Syllabus" on the Gakumu Information System.
- Undergraduate students, ISEPTUFS Students and Japanese Studies Students can check their grades on the Gakumu Information System. Research students should contact the Student Exchange Division, and Preparatory Research Students should contact the JLC Office, for inquiries on their grades.
