This course is taught in simpler language than regular lectures in English. It is especially recommended to students who are not familiar with lectures taught in English only. Students are assessed by their level of understanding of the course content rather than by their English language level.

This course mainly consists of four components: theoretical learning, case studies, collaborative online international learning (COIL), and proposal-making as problem-solving. Theoretical learning overviews related theories focused on education, learning and brain, culture, peace, conflict, violence, international law, international organizations, peace education, and COIL with a focus on fostering discussions. The case study discusses the peace education programs conducted in the conflict-affected areas. In proposal-making, students design the peace education program by applying learned theories and knowledge gained through interaction with students in the classroom and other countries. This course asks students to adopt a social science perspective and consider the trajectory of discussions about multiculturalism in Japanese society. Specifically, students will consider not only who is different from - to paraphrase the late Harumi Befu (2001) - a hegemonically homogeneous "Japanese" subject, but the sociocultural processes through which various groups are "Othered." Instead of multiculturalism as a neutral, objective recognition of human difference, this course will challenge students to see multiculturalism as a specific mode of organizing – culturally, economically, politically – real and imagined human difference.

Adopting the lens of cultural anthropology, we will examine key events, groups, and movements. Students will learn how cultural, economic, philosophical, political, and religious forces have impacted how human difference is understood. By grappling with the specific experiences of different groups, this course asks students to consider the interface between particular identities and practices and how others conceptualize them outside of those communities.

Students who complete this course will gain an awareness of various debates within contemporary Japanese society and an understanding of different minority groups' experiences and perspectives. Students will practice and develop social science research skills through a semester-long project.

Globalization is a key concept utilized in a wide range of fields such as economics, politics, education, and culture. However, although often discussed, the term is seldom clearly defined, and arguments about its nature tend to polarize opinions in irreconcilable ways. In this class we will aim to explore the characteristics of globalization, and discuss from multiple angles the social changes it has generated. We will attempt to do this in a twofold manner: on the one hand, by placing the discussion in the contemporary world society; on the other hand, we will discuss the actual implications that globalization has in the lives of people, organizations and cultures. How has Japan and Asia been transformed as a product of globalization? What have been, so far, its measurable effects? How can globalization help alleviate poverty and bring about world peace? The subject matter is the literary representations of space. The primary texts will demonstrate literary representations of various spaces including both urban and suburban Tokyo, other Japanese regions, and fantastical fictional spaces. The discussions will focus on the interactions between spaces and narratives. How do spaces uphold the narratives? How do the authors construct literary spaces to reflect the human psyche and social issues of this era?

Because the central debates concern interdisciplinary researches, the course further aims to raise awareness about the urban/spatial approach. The course will examine contemporary literature against its (sub)urban setting on sociological, economic, cultural, and political levels, using Tokyo in postwar economic growth, recession, and globalization as a case study. Furthermore, we will discuss the prominent function of space in Japanese magical realism.

The wider cultural impact of the cities is presented, with reference to tourism, publishing, film, music, art and literature in various periods. The crafts and consumer goods produced in traditional neighborhoods are another topic for study, and a class each will be devoted to the food culture of Kyoto and Tokyo past and present. Students will produce a research essay on a relevant topic of their choice with the guidance of the instructor.

This is an introductory class to 'classical' film analysis. We will explore how films 'work', how they convey meaning, and how a two-dimensional moving image on a screen can give us goosebumps.

We live in an increasingly media-saturated world, dominated by audio-visual media, and we learn much about other countries by watching films produced from within those societies. In order to be active participants-rather than passive receivers-in this discourse, it is important to understand these moving images as constructed and to understand the interplay of their components in making meaning. Studying film, the first audio-visual medium with a history of over 120 years, will give you an excellent basis to do so. We will work closely along one of the standard works, "Film Art: An Introduction" (Bordwell and Thompson, 2013, international edition). Over the course of the term, we will cover the principal aspects of film, its narrative form and style. We will also watch and analyse films together in class, in order to practice the concepts already acquired and to hone your writing about films in order to prepare you for the final film analytical essay.

Classes will include a lecture on the chapter for the week, exercises, and discussion time to clarify points and concepts. You are required to work through the respective chapter prior to class, come prepared to ask questions and deepen your understanding of the topics discussed through the exercises. We will also have short quizzes to check your understanding of the topics discussed. For your final assignment, you will write an essay of 1,000 words, analysing a feature film of your choice.

This course aims to inspire young researchers to explore Food Studies approaches in Japan Studies.

The class takes a topic-based format and includes active learning activities to stimulate discussion and critical thinking. Classic cuisines such as honzen, kaiseki and shojin and iconic favourites such as sushi and ramen are examined from a transnational perspective. Students are introduced to the critical discourse on Japanese food as it relates to topics including politicized issues such as whaling, domestic labour and production shortages and the slow food movement, or the roles of food in religious practice such as Zen Buddhism, mountain religion and pre-modern vegetarianism. Food technology, economics, distribution and materiality are discussed where appropriate.

By the end of the course, students will have gained an appreciation of the intellectual and historical complexity, regional diversity and transnationality of food culture in Japan.

The United Nations has been the centerpiece of the world order since its establishment in 1945. Over the past 77 years, the United Nations has been playing a preeminent role in the issues of international peace and security, development, human rights and humanitarian affairs. It has passed through the changing world situations and in recent years, it is facing yet another hard situation. Currently, Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) are forming the framework of the UN Development Agenda, "Transforming our world: the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development," and the work of the UN system and other main international organizations in implementing them. At just past the mid-point towards the 2030, however, we are surrounded by the unexpected situation, such as COVID-19, Ukraine and other conflicts.

The course will begin by glancing at the UN system organigram, ensuring the positions of the principal organs of the United Nations and the UN system organization. The focus will be placed on the work of the Economic and Social Council, which is tasked to coordinate the work of the specialized agencies as well as the funds and programmes of the United Nations system in the area of international economic, social, cultural, educational, health and related matters. Since the adoption of the sustainable development goals, the Economic and Social Council has been responsible together with the General Assembly for the implementation of the sustainable development goals. Then we will try to assess the current situation, focusing on their effects on some of the principal organs, and consider how the global process is trying to address these unexpected situations. We will be looking at the outcome of the SDG Summit (2023) and the global process lined up in the near future, especially the Summit of the Future, which is planned to take place in mid-September 2024. We will also consider the value of multilateralism. At the end, we will be looking at how the implementation on SDGs are going and how much more efforts need to be provided to the aim of Building Back Better.

Human mobilities and migration have been a constant phenomenon, appearance, and process throughout			
history. With advances in information and Communication Technologies, migration trends have morphed			

into mobilities such that those who stay can be mobile while staying put. Consequently, mobilities are not limited only to the movement of persons, but considers the circulation of objects, food, practices/ideas and cultures.

The course entails working with the main concepts used in migration, mobilities and transnational studies to build and analyse typologies of migratory flows and think critically about theories and empirical research strategies. We will use broad definitions of mobilities, migration and transnationalism and critically engage with and interrogate the various concepts as theoretical approaches and scientific research methods. This foregrounds migration as highly complex and multidimensional reality, and hence, requires to be analysed from different vantage points and discourses. Under these broad categories, we will unpack concepts of mobilities and migration: trends and patterns, migrant communities (Hometown Associations) and new identities, childhood mobilities and migration, cultures of food and eating, transnationalism/transnational families/transnational livelihoods, and Hometown Associations. Students will get to appreciate the complexities of transnational migration and its impact on contemporary social relationships and cultural life, and to explore how migration is changing contemporary forms of relatedness (gender, kinship, and other forms of intimacy).

There has been a recent interest in food, especially within migration studies. Here, we are interested in food as a universal medium for the expression of a variety of cultural issues among migrant communities rituals, gender relations, marriage, kinship and identity. What is the role of food as a medium of exchange and consumption, sociality, and identity?

Utilizing court records, legal proclamations, and police documents, it attempts to elucidate the social history of unlicensed panhandlers, unregistered vagrants, unlicensed brothel proprietors, gambling syndicates, bandits, and underworld figures. At the same time, it will examine the various mechanisms utilized by the authorities to regulate the sex trade, manage poverty, prevent criminal activity, and maintain law and order in the city. Accordingly, it will focus heavily on the regulatory functions performed by local social groups, such as licensed brothel operators' guilds, licensed beggar associations, and organizations of flophouse proprietors. Thereby, it seeks to understand the role that legally-sanctioned social groups played in efforts to police individuals who existed on the margins or outside of the legally-sanctioned status order.

Academically, subtitling is now considered a mode of Audiovisual Translation (AVT), a branch of Translation Studies that deals with the translation of film, TV, and other audiovisual. Subtitling has a rich history within Japan dating back to the 1930s. Furthermore, the English subtitling of Japanese media has a unique place within AVT thanks to the ever-increasing popularity of Japanese film and, especially, anime. Combined with the stark cultural differences between Japan and much of the rest of the world, subtitling Japanese audiovisual media is a prime candidate for the focus of any AVT course.

During the semester, we will discuss and analyse the theory of subtitling, which has become increasingly popular in research since the 1990s, as well as learn the practice of subtitling through several workshop-style classes, where we will subtitle clips together (please bring a computer and, if possible, earphones for the second part of the course).

This course will be conducted in English, with some Japanese. Translating from Japanese to English will be required, but assistance will be provided.

A Critical Overview of the Japanese Cinema 2

This course surveys the Japanese cinema, from the postwar to the contemporary. The Japanese film industry, with its long history, vibrant culture, and prolific output as produced a wide range of works, many of them reaching "canonical" status in film history, others remaining largely obscure, both in Japan and abroad. It has also produced an expansive array of scholarly responses, and played a crucial role in the development of film studies as an academic discipline.

In this class, we will survey the history as well as the historiography of Japanese narrative film by reading a selection of the aforementioned scholarly responses, chosen either for their prominence (or notoriety) or due to their discussion of a significant film or film-historical movement. By focusing on articles or book chapters published in English, we will also gain an impression on how Japanese cinema is being presented, received, discussed, and categorised outside Japan.

Students will also work on a group project, analysing one film and present on your findings.

Students will gain a good knowledge of key texts in the discipline, as well as experience in reading and applying scholarly articles.
