

Oakland and the World: Race and Empire in a Pacific Seaport

講演要旨

Located on the northern coast of California across the bay from San Francisco, Oakland is rarely perceived as a city with a global history. Nevertheless, this talk contends that Oakland's reach has long extended far beyond its municipal borders. The city is an ideal site for understanding how people, money, ideas, and various forms of domination have traveled back and forth across the Pacific Ocean for hundreds of years. By situating Oakland in broader histories of global racemaking and imperial expansion, we can better appreciate how overlooked places contributed to the rise of the transpacific world.
