The use of realia and material culture, particularly maps, is a key teaching method. All students will write a report on an area of Tokyo or Kyoto using cartographic materials. The wider cultural impact of the cities is presented, with reference to tourism, publishing, film, music, art and literature in various periods. The crafts and consumer goods produced in traditional neighborhoods are another topic for study, and a class each will be devoted to the food culture of Kyoto and Tokyo past and present. Students will produce a research essay on a relevant topic of their choice with the guidance of the instructor.

In order to be active participants-rather than passive receivers-in this discourse, it is important to understand these moving images as constructed and to understand the interplay of their components in making meaning. Studying film, the first audio-visual medium with a history of over 120 years, will give you an excellent basis to do so. We will work closely along one of the standard works, "Film Art: An Introduction" (Bordwell and Thompson, 2013, international edition). Over the course of the term, we will cover the principal aspects of film, its narrative form and style. We will also watch and analyse films together in class, in order to practice the concepts already acquired and to hone your writing about films in order to prepare you for the final film analytical essay. Classes will include a lecture on the chapter for the week, exercises, and discussion time to clarify points and concepts. You are required to work through the respective chapter prior to class, come prepared to ask questions and deepen your understanding of the topics discussed through the exercises. We will also have short quizzes to check your understanding of the topics discussed. For your final assignment, you will write an essay of 1,000 words, analysing a feature film of your choice.</p>

Why have modernization and science, which supposedly contributed to human progress, not yet abolished this barbaric practice of “war”? In 1947, three years after the term “genocide” was coined to describe the systematic destruction of particular race or ethnic group, comedian Charlie Chaplin remarked in his film Monsieur Verdoux:</p> <p>“One murder makes a villain; millions, a hero. Numbers sanctify, my good fellow.”</p> <p>What history and power make this absurdity possible? And what should be done to resolve it? In this class, we will explore the answers to these questions through various documentaries, texts, and vigorous discussion.</p>

Currently, Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) are forming the framework of the UN Development Agenda, "Transforming our world: the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development," and the work of the UN system and other main international organizations in implementing them. At just past the mid-point towards the 2030, however, we are surrounded by the unexpected situation, such as COVID-19, Ukraine and other conflicts.</p> <p>The course will begin by glancing at the UN system organigram, ensuring the positions of the principal organs of the United Nations and the UN system organization. The focus will be placed on the work of the Economic and Social Council, which is tasked to coordinate the work of the specialized agencies as well as the funds and programmes of the United Nations system in the area of international economic, social, cultural, educational, health and related matters. Since the adoption of the sustainable development goals, the Economic and Social Council has been responsible together with the General Assembly for the implementation of the sustainable development goals. Then we will try to assess the current situation, focusing on their effects on some of the principal organs, and consider how the global process is trying to address these unexpected situations. We will be looking at the outcome of the SDG Summit (2023) and the global process lined up in the near future, especially the Summit of the Future, which is planned to take place in mid-September 2024. We will also consider the value of multilateralism. At the end, we will be looking at how the implementation on SDGs are going and how much more efforts need to be provided to the aim of Building Back Better.</p>

<p>What role does "religion" play in public governance in Africa? What is "religion" and what is politics? How do we make sense of the interface between "religion" and politics? "Religion" is very pervasive in Africa and much of the world. But given the intellectual history of the concept and its analytical connotations since the late 19th Century, unproblematised answers to what constitutes "religion" cannot be taken lightly. Commencing from late 19th Century, scholars who have studied the continent of Africa, particularly the so-named Sub-Saharan Africa, have been baffled by the pervasiveness of "religion" in public governance. Resultantly, these scholars have deployed different theoretical approaches, much of which are informed by a binary between "tradition" and "modernity"; "secularization" and "sacralization" to study the interface between religion and politics on the continent. More recently since the 21st Century, a few scholars have deployed the concept Christian nationalism to index an impression that Christianity is hijacking the "secular" ethos of public governance. Taking the above as context, this course has been designed to explore the complex nexus between "religion" and public governance in Africa. Instead of separating "religion" and politics as irreconcilable foes, the course will explore the extent to which "religion" undergirds crucial matters of public governance, such as citizenship, economic transaction, law and human rights, and gendered relations on the continent. Concurrently, engaging the complicated issues of religion and politics, including the idea concept of Christian nationalism, the course will argue that the major institutions of public governance, politics and economics are anchored on the role religion plays in answering the "why" and "how" questions in the advancement of human flourishing. The course will also analyse instances where the politicisation of religion has threatened to undo all the gains Africa has made since independence. In sum, the course will provide a historical trajectory of the interactions between "religion" and politics in Africa since colonialism, all of which will indicate the role "religion" continues to play as an anvil of legitimising public governance.</p>

<p>Subtitling has become part of our everyday life thanks to its constant presence in the media we consume. But what is it really, and who makes the subtitles we watch, and how? Academically, subtitling is now considered a mode of Audiovisual Translation (AVT), a branch of Translation Studies that deals with the translation of film, TV, and other audiovisual. Subtitling has a rich history within Japan dating back to the 1930s. Furthermore, the English subtitling of Japanese media has a unique place within AVT thanks to the ever-increasing popularity of Japanese film and, especially, anime. Combined with the stark cultural differences between Japan and much of the rest of the world, subtitling Japanese audiovisual media is a prime candidate for the focus of any AVT course.</p> <p>During the semester, we will discuss and analyse the theory of subtitling, which has become increasingly popular in research since the 1990s, as well as learn the practice of subtitling through several workshop-style classes, where we will subtitle clips together (please bring a computer and, if possible, earphones for the second part of the course).</p> <p>This course will be conducted in English, with some Japanese. Translating from Japanese to English will be required, but assistance will be provided.</p>

A Critical Overview of the Japanese Cinema 2

<p>This course surveys the Japanese cinema, from the postwar to the contemporary. The Japanese film industry, with its long history, vibrant culture, and prolific output as produced a wide range of works, many of them reaching "canonical" status in film history, others remaining largely obscure, both in Japan and abroad. It has also produced an expansive array of scholarly responses, and played a crucial role in the development of film studies as an academic discipline.</p> <p>In this class, we will survey the history as well as the historiography of Japanese narrative film by reading a selection of the aforementioned scholarly responses, chosen either for their prominence (or notoriety) or due to their discussion of a significant film or film-historical movement. By focussing on articles or book chapters published in English, we will also gain an impression on how Japanese cinema is being presented, received, discussed, and categorised outside Japan.</p> <p>Students will also work on a group project, analysing one film and present on your findings.</p> <p>Students will gain a good knowledge of key texts in the discipline, as well as experience in reading and applying scholarly articles.</p>
